This hinders the ability to accurately assess and mitigate the birdstrike risk and also masks potential underlying problematic changes to bird populations and strike trends.

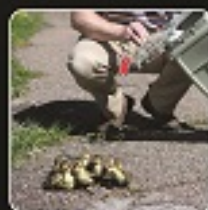


